# Historical Sketch Of IMMANUEL LUTHERAN CHURCH Pflugerville, Texas

1852	Pastor J.M. Kugel, a circuit rider, conducts worship services in the community.
1860s	Pastor J.B. Lieb, member of Texas Synod, serves once a year
1869	Pastor F. Ernst serves 40 souls nears Windscott Creek on the Henry Lisso farm in a small frame building used as a church.
1871	The first Immanuel Lutheran Congregation forms; Constitution is adopted on April 10;(remove) Congregational listing: 27 heads of households
1872	Due to disagreements, the congregation disbands; About one-half of this group later starts the Evangelical Church at Dessau; Remainder form Immanuel Congregation and the Church at Richland.
1874	In April, Texas Synod sends Pastor F. Jesse, and on May 31, a Constitution is proposed and adopted by 11 members.
1875	Pastor William Pfennig installed; First church building is dedicated on June 20; it is erected on 5 acres of land donated by William Bohls on July 10, 1875; Immanuel joins the Texas Synod; Congregation has a Parochial School taught by the pastor; The village of Pflugerville was then located at the present intersection of Immanuel Road (Dessau Road) and Pflugerville East Road
1879	Pastor M. Oehler installed
1881	Pastor Oehler dies October 24 and is buried in the church cemetery
1882	Pastor Theo Uhdau installed
1884	Pastor H. Daude installed

1887	Pastor H. Lettermann installed; Texas Synod meets here; Ladies Aid organized February 12 for the purpose of caring for the cemetery; A parochial school is established; New pews added; The past decade had been a difficult one for the congregation.
1889	William Pfluger purchases 4 acres from William Bohls and donated it for church purposes on January 29, 1898.
1894	Ladies Aid dissolved
1897	Pastor A. Hartmann installed; Two additional rooms were added to the parsonage.
1898	Pastor William Pfennig is supply pastor
1899	Pastor William Flachmeier installed
1900s	First choir organized with 40 members
1904	The village of Pflugerville moves to be near the new railroad.
1908	Pastor G. Stricker installed
1909	It is resolved to build a new church; Pastor Stricker begins to also serve Dessau Lutheran Church as do all of Immanuel's Pastors who succeed him until the 1980's.
1910	Red brick church dedicated January 23- Cost: \$10,300
1911	First telephone installed
1912	Sewing Circle organized
1913	Luther League organized Sept. 14 with 34 members; Texas Synodical Convention here for second time, April 9-14.
1914	Pastor G. Stricker dies and is buried in church cemetery. Pastor H. Schliesser installed. New parsonage built costing \$3,000.00.

1915	Tabea Verein (Ladies Aid) organized February 18. Dissolved in 1960 into the A.L.C.W.
1916	Luther League Auditorium built (the first Lutheran Parish hall in Texas); Host to Texas District Luther League Convention; Two acres of land bought from Emil H. Bohls for enlargement of cemetery; First resident Pastor, Shliesser) to have an automobile
1917	A change is made in the dues class system for financial giving from 2 to 3 classes: \$6, \$12, and \$18 a year.
1919	Host to Texas District Luther League Convention
1920	16 Sunday School teachers organize and join the Texas Sunday School Teachers Association.
1920	Finance classes raised to \$10, \$20, and \$30 per year.
1924	Pastor M.J. Schwarz installed; Congregation hosts State Sunday School Teachers Convention; Due to change in pastors, the 50 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary is celebrated on November 2.
1928	Red brick church is destroyed by fire March 16; Services are held in Luther League Auditorium.
1929	A \$43,000 brick church with pipe organ is dedicated on March 3; more than 1000 people attend dedication.
1930	Affiliated with American Lutheran Church
1934	Pastor E. B. Knaak installed
1935	Host to Texas District of American Lutheran Church
1936	Women's Missionary Society organized May 27
1940s	During this decade the transition from German to the English language is made; The American Lutheran Hymnal is first used; The women of the congregation become voting members.

1941	Brotherhood organizes February 10
1943	The old school building is sold at an auction for \$90.
1944	70 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary observed; Cemetery stone fence is erected.
1946	Change from Common Chalice to individual Communion cups
1947	Driveway paved
1948	629 foot well dug and equipped with electric pump; Finance classes raised to \$12.50, \$25, and \$37.50 per year.
1949	Pastor W. A. Mueller installed and leaves a few months later. Back of church basement excavated for kitchen facilities; 75 <sup>th</sup> anniversary celebrated May 29 with three worship services; Pastor Kurt Hartmann installed; Church bulletins introduced
1950	Water piped to cemetery
1951	The Duplex envelope system replaces the class system of giving; Junior Mission Band organizes in September (later changed to "Junior Lutherans")
1952	Installation of church's kerosene heating system
1954	Constitution revised and congregation incorporates; 80 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebration on May 23 and May 30.
1957	Memorial contributions for Education/Building Fund begun; Water storage tank installed; "Service Book and Hymnal" introduced; Pastor Wilson Hill installed; "Church Chat" newsletter started; Pairs and Spares organized
1958	Retired debt of present church Public address system installed
1959	85 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary Thankoffering for renovating the church was \$3,699.

1960 Texas District becomes the Southern District of The American Lutheran Church;

Tabea Verein (Ladies Aid) and the Women's Missionary Society dissolve to become part of the new ALCW (American Lutheran Church Women).

- 1961 Constitution revised and adopted
- 1962 The Pflugerville High School team receives recognition for having won 55 consecutive games.
- \$100,000 building program started;
   Groundbreaking services for parsonage and education building on November 24;
   Pastor Wilson Hill leaves to go to San Antonio.
- 1964 Pastor Donald Luckemeyer installed;

"Immanuel Image" becomes new name for the monthly church newsletter.

90<sup>th</sup> Anniversary observed November 29 with dedication services for the new parsonage and education building.

- 1970 Installation of air-conditioning in the church; Education-Parsonage building notes burned Jan. 18; Close- circuit T.V. installed in Education Bldg.
- 1971 Tennis court erected
- 1973 Pastor Luckemeyer leaves to go to Karnes City;

Pastor A.H. Muehlbrad, retired and member of the congregation, is supply pastor;

\$12,216 is spent for renovation of church and education building;

Constitution changed to permit earlier communion of youth;

Pastor D. Lee Muehlbrad installed August 26;

Butane gas system converted to natural gas;

Preparation for centennial celebration includes renovation and painting of the Church Sanctuary, Basement and Educational Building. Many anniversary gifts are given including: the Chapel with altar, carpeting and chairs; individual chalice communion set; new office equipment; carpeting; pew cushions; tables; chairs; chain link fence; flag pole, Sanctuary lamp and many other items.

Reorganized and established new congregational standing committees;

Cemetery Endowment fund now large enough so that expenses no longer need to be subsidized by congregation;

Water System connects with Manville Water District;

Congregation Centennial Pictorial Directory published;

Congregation receives estate of Mr. and Mrs. Fritz Schoen

Centennial Celebration on May 26: morning/afternoon services and dedication of historical marker:

Pastor takes youth to Confirmation Camp on annual basis.

1975 Elder program begun, whereby Elders assist the pastors in worship service;

Disposition of Schoen real estate;

Congregation participates in United Mission Appeal;

Congregation's largest Confirmation Class confirmed – 37

Vernagene Mott appointed Head Organist Nov 2, 1975

1976 Supplement to 1974 Pictorial Directory made;

Congregation celebrates National Bicentennial year on July 24 with "Old Timer" Worship Service;

New brick maintenance building completed;

Worship and Music Committee formed;

J.C. and Company Youth Choir officially begun;

Education Building and Parsonage roofs replaced;

Pastor Wilson Hill hired as Visitation Pastor

1977 Congregation now entitled to send two lay delegates to the District convention;

Receive deed of home of Regina Arend;

Begin having two morning Worship Services on Communion Sunday.

1978 Purchased and began using the "Lutheran Book of Worship". Worship Ushering System established (sole responsibility of council in the past):

Assist in establishing mission congregation in Round Rock; Restore the original reed organ (1872?);

Major repair on pipe organ;

Build new & repair old streets on church property;

1978 Congregation participates in the Challenge of the Generations

(cont.) Financial Campaign;

Sacristy remodeled with new cabinets and running water;

Pre-Theological fund established

1979 Donation of two lots of land at lake Travis by Mrs. Elsie Doerpinghaus; Architectural Committee formed:

"Think Tank" Committee formed to explore needs of additional pastoral help and recommends a 2<sup>nd</sup> pastor;

Brotherhood District Convention held here.

1980 Pastor Stephen M. Schur called as second pastor;

Pastor D. Lee Muehlbrad issued new Call as Senior Pastor;

Master Plan Steering Committee replaces Architectural Committee:

Vietnamese refugee Phen Tran family sponsored;

Pastor D. Lee Muehlbrad honored at 25th Anniversary of Ordination;

Pastor Schur installed August 17;

Pictorial Directory published;

Bell Choir formed after gift of bells;

Pastor Hill retires from being Visitation Pastor

1981 Decide to build multi-purpose building and renovate Education Building after \$100,000 is raised;

Stone cross on church tower destroyed by storm;

Carillon System installed;

40<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Brotherhood celebrated;

Begin two services every Sunday

1982 Land site for new building done by volunteer work; Immanuel's "Noah's Ark" float wins first place in several parades; 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Ordination of Pastor A.H. Muehlbrad

1983 Volunteer workers complete new building;

Multi-purpose building dedicated October 23 – Parish Hall

Close circuit television in Chapel is in color;

Congregation computer purchased;

Two members in seminary

1984 Pastor Wilson Hill honored at 50th Anniversary of Ordination;

Mr. and Mrs. Emil Bohls give 3 acres adjoining the north and south side of church property;

3 lay delegates go to Southern District Convention;

	Long Range Committee studies Day Care Center; Pastor Casey Zesch installed
1985	First Christmas Luminary; American Lutheran Church, Lutheran Church in America and American Evangelical Church merges to Become Evangelical Lutheran Church in America; ALCW becomes WELCA (Women of Evangelical Lutheran Church in America); Day School Program started
1987	Pastor D. Lee Muehlbard leaves.
1988	Pastor Ray Kraemer installed January 1, ELCA merger took place.
1989	Tired and Retired Group started
1990	Restoration of Sanctuary and Basement; Men's Breakfast group started; Constitution revised
1991	Elevator installed; SEARCH began; Ordination of Pastor Lucinda Rueter Zesch
1993	Pastor Don Just serves as Interim Pastor; Pastor Wilson Hill dies and is buried in church cemetery
1994	Pastor Zesch leaves. Pastor Scott Postlewait installed; New Nursery completed
1995	Children's Choir started
1997	Pastor Scott Postlewait leaves Immanuel on February 28th; Pastor Tom Kesselring ordained and installed on August 31st
1998	Restoration/Upgrade of pipe organ at cost of \$97,000; Organ dedication; Repaving of parking lot; 125 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary celebration begins with Veteran's Day observance;
1999	125 <sup>th</sup> Anniversary of Immanuel celebrated on May 30 <sup>th</sup>

Came to ILC from Shepherd of the Hills, Austin where she served as Pastor of Family Life Ministry.

"Sweet Little Jesus Boy" ILC production, Feb. 15 & 16, 2020. 2020 In response to Covid 19 virus pandemic, ILC closed its doors in March 2020, to comply with state/county orders.

Worship services were conducted on-line through Zoom, so members could log in to watch from home.

Installation of Visitation ministry and communion ministers to the Homebound, March 8, 2020.

Church Council and all standing committees conducted monthly meetings by Zoom.

Sherry Markert was hired as our Church Business Administrator. Replaced Church Windows with new financial and church records Information system called Realm.

Telephone ministry established to make contact with seniors during the time of the pandemic.

First on-line communion on April 9, 2020.

Graduation recognition drive-through May 24, 2020.

Ralph & Marylee Kirkley retired from their many years as leaders of the ILC Food Pantry

On-line Confirmation service May 31, 2020.

Zoom Circle, Bible study, and WELCA board meetings, June 2020. WELCA continued to serve people in our community and throughout the world.

On-line Sunday School material located on ILC website for use during Covid 19, for children and adult Sunday School classes. Zoom VBS, July 2020.

ILC received a \$266,000 Paycheck Protection Program loan from the Federal Government. The loan was later forgiven and changed to a grant. It allowed the church and day school to keep our staff intact during the worst days of the COVID shutdown.

Hired Frieda Mottonen as part-time youth director in August 2020 A fund drive was initiated for the purchase of Technology Upgrades which would support live streaming of worship services.

Pastor Candice Combs resigned Sept. 15, 2020.

Since we had not completed the call process, supply pastors were Scheduled to lead services on Zoom each week.

Worship leaders spent many hours recording music and preparing slides for Zoom Worship Services.

Claudia Cardwell resigned as day school director, and she was replaced by Krissy O'Brien.

In November, our worship spaces were fully decorated for Christmas! Several worship services in December were fully prerecorded in our worship spaces, with the use of our upgraded Technology Equipment.

On-line worshipers were grateful to see our worship spaces!

In December, ILC hosted a modified drive through luminary with only the scene at the Manger, and a group gathered for Christmas caroling (mindful of social distancing).

2021 Lent services were broadcast by Zoom each week. Plans were made to administer drive through communion on Ash Wednesday, but plans had to be cancelled due to the "Snowpocalypse", which left the whole area without power for several days.

Online services were held on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

On Easter Sunday, ILC held a beautiful drive-up sunrise service from the front steps of the Sanctuary. 3 crosses were erected near the cemetery. Members brought flowers to decorate the flower cross on the church steps. Drive through communion was administered, then the traditional Easter Service was broadcast online by Zoom.

Pastor Matthew Groenke arrived during the last week of April, and delivered his first message to us on Sunday, May 2<sup>nd</sup>! He came to ILC from Twinsburg, Ohio.

Pastor joined several members in caroling to shut-ins in May 2021. After more than one year of worshiping online using Zoom, Pastor Matthew led our first in-person service in the Parish Hall on June 6, 2021, with 116 present. There was social distancing, face masks, pre-packaged Communion elements, and no sharing of peace, but there was great joy In meeting together!

On July 25, 2021, Pastor Matthew Groenke was officially installed as the New Pastor of ILC, with Bishop Sue Briner officiating. Reception held in Parish Hall.

Rally Day, Sept. 2021, we returned to two worship services and Sunday School. Still social distancing by roping off every other pew.

For the 1<sup>st</sup> time in the history of ILC, the annual church picnic was moved from June to September, and we enjoyed the cooler fall temperatures. We returned to our tradition with the drive through luminary on Saturday, Dec. 11.

Candlelight Christmas Eve Services returned at the traditional times of 4:30 and 7:00 PM. Both were well attended.

2022 After 2 years of not being able to hold Lent services in person, Pastor Matthew led Holden Evening Prayer services each week at 10:00 AM In the Chapel and 6:30 PM in the Sanctuary.

He taught a 1<sup>st</sup> Communion class, and participants received 1<sup>st</sup> Communion during the Maundy Thursday service.

The traditional soup and sandwich meals prior to services were not offered due to the high number of Covid cases in the community. Two services were held on Easter Sunday at 8:00 AM and 10:30 AM.

The summer schedule included 8:00 AM Traditional and a 9:30 AM Contemporary Services.

On Rally Day, Sept. 11, we returned to two worship services and Sunday School, with 8:00 AM Traditional, 9:15 AM Sunday School, and 10:30 AM

Contemporary.

The annual church picnic was held on Sept. 25, in Pfluger Park. In September, Covid cases were trending lower. We returned to our practice of offering individual cups of wine for communion at the 8:00 AM service in the Sanctuary.

We continued to use prepackaged elements for the late service until Nov. 6, All Saints Day. On this day, Pastor Matthew offered an intinction option for the late service. This was very well received with only a limited number choosing the prepackaged option. No common cup was offered.

Drive through luminary was held on Saturday, Dec. 10.

Sunday School Christmas program was Sunday, Dec. 18.

A "Blue Christmas" service was offered for those who have lost loved ones on Tuesday, Dec. 20.

Candlelight Christmas Eve Services were held at 4:30 and 7:00 PM, with Communion offered at both services by intinction.

The Christmas Day Service was held at 10:00 AM.
